Welcome

Are you taking your first steps towards a career? Maybe you are looking for a new direction or would like to progress further in your current career? Or perhaps you are supporting someone such as a family member, a pupil, or a colleague.

The <u>Careers Service</u> has produced this Career Entry Routes guide to offer an overview of entry routes available and the progression between different levels of qualification, from **Entry Level through to Level 8**. Depending on your area of interest, there are opportunities available within traditional **classroombased education**, such as A Levels; **vocationally related qualifications/vocational education and training**, such as apprenticeships; as well as via **training programmes**, such as those funded by DfE and local councils.

The <u>Careers Service Careers Occupational Information Unit (COIU)</u> provides up-to-date careers information about different sectors of the Northern Ireland economy. These resources explore the career options on offer and include industry insights and career profiles from those working/studying locally.

This Careers Entry Routes guide is designed to be used alongside <u>COIU careers resources</u>, to guide those seeking to build a career in their chosen sector.


Qualification Levels

A qualification shows employers, educators and learners what you have learnt and what you can do as a result of that learning.

▶ There is a wide variety of qualifications available so they are grouped together into levels based on criteria and what other qualifications they can lead to. Knowing about the different levels means that you can identify what you need for your chosen career.


▶ In Northern Ireland, most qualifications taken through work, school, college or university, fit into one of nine levels from Entry Level through to Level 8. The levels are based on knowledge, skills and competence that each qualification assesses. The higher the level, the greater the demand of the qualification.

Qualifications information

Entry Level Qualifications



- Entry level qualifications can help build skills, increase knowledge and boost confidence. They are known as 'certificates' or 'awards', and are open to anyone interested in gaining a recognised qualification. There are no entry requirements.
- ► There are **over 100 Entry Level Certificates** to choose from across a **variety of subject areas**.
- ▶ If taken at school, you will complete them in Years 11 and 12 (ages 14 to 16). They are also available in further education colleges and may be offered in other settings; the workplace; community settings through voluntary work; prisons and young offenders' institutions; residential or daycare settings.
- Entry Level qualifications are usually made up of a number of separately assessed units.
- ► You can study Entry Level Certificates at a pace that suits you and progress from one entry level to the next. There are **three different entry levels**, which reflect attainment in the chosen qualification.
- At Entry Level 3, qualifications and programmes include but are not limited to: Key Skills; BTEC Entry 3 vocational study qualifications. They can demonstrate knowledge and skills which may lead to work-based learning, like an apprenticeship, or straight to employment (please note that from September 2025, the new Northern Ireland Essential Skills Qualifications for Digital ICT will be available at Entry Level 3. They will also be available at Levels 1 and 2 and will replace Essentials Skills ICT at Levels 1 and 2).

Skills for Life and Work



- ► The <u>Skills for Life and Work</u> training programme provides young people with the opportunity to work towards recognised qualifications and gain valuable work experience.
- ► The programme is open to 16-17 year olds, with **extended eligibility** for persons under 22 years with a disability; or under 24 years for persons from an in-care background.
- ► Time is spent in the **workplace**, and also training with a **training** organisation/Further Education College, working towards gaining Entry Level/Level 1 qualifications, and in some cases, Level 2 qualifications.
- ▶ Skills for Life and Work focuses on the **achievement of qualifications** in: personal and social development, employability, professional and technical/vocational, and essential skills in literacy, numeracy and ICT (please note that from September 2025, Essential Skills in ICT will become Digital ICT).
- Skills for Life and Work also aims to facilitate participants' progression to higher level training. This could include aiming for the Department's <u>Traineeship</u> or <u>Apprenticeship</u> programmes, or other employment.

Level 2 qualifications



- Level 2 qualifications show that you have good knowledge and understanding of a subject and the ability to do a variety of tasks with some guidance or supervision. They are suitable for many job roles.
- ► Examples of Level 2 qualifications include: GCSE grades A*- C (and grades 4 to 9 in England); Level 2 Apprenticeships; Traineeships; Level 2 awards, diplomas and certificates; BTEC and OCR Nationals; Essential Skills; ESOL; Music grades 4 and 5 and O level grades A-C (please note that O levels are legacy qualifications and are no longer offered in the UK).

Traineeships 🕟

- ► A traineeship gives you the opportunity to gain valuable work experience and knowledge in the sector you are interested in, while also improving your employability skills, English and Maths. It can help you progress to a full-time job, apprenticeship, or further education.
- ▶ If you undertake the Traineeship, you will study a programme of qualifications working towards a **Traineeship Diploma**.

 Learners who achieve GCSE Maths and English at Level 2, in addition to the relevant Level 2 qualifications in their chosen occupational area, can achieve the **equivalent* of up to five GCSEs at grades A* to C**.
- Advisory services are available to provide further guidance on occupational areas, associated qualifications and progression routes.
- NI <u>Traineeships</u> will typically take one to two years to complete on a full-time basis.

Apprenticeships

- Apprenticeships can help you to achieve your career goal by developing relevant skills and knowledge. Apprenticeships offer the opportunity to earn while you learn. Working alongside experienced staff, you will receive on-the-job training. You will also receive 'off-the-job' training, usually on a day-release basis with a training provider, to work towards achieving vocational qualifications and Essential Skills qualifications.
- ► Apprenticeships are offered from **Level 2**, up to **Level 7**. For more information, please see <u>Types of Apprenticeships</u>. To learn more about Level 2 Apprenticeships currently available, please see <u>Level 2 Apprenticeship Frameworks</u>.
- Please note, if you are interested in becoming an apprentice under the <u>Apprenticeships programme</u> (or the <u>Higher Level</u> <u>Apprenticeships programme</u>), you must be in a job or have found an employer who is willing to take you on as an apprentice in the occupational area relevant to your chosen apprenticeship.
- Finding someone to take you on as an apprentice is really like finding any other job. You can, for example:
 - search for apprenticeship opportunities online
 - contact your local Jobs and Benefits office
 - search on <u>JobApplyNI</u>; search the <u>UCAS CareerFinder tool</u>; search <u>newspapers</u>; look for vacancies on employer or <u>recruitment websites</u>
 - contact employers yourself (you should make them aware that you want to start an apprenticeship under the Apprenticeships programme)
 - you can also contact your local college/training provider, who may be aware of vacancies
- Some employers may offer their own in-house apprenticeship/ training schemes, and these are usually advertised in the local news media.
- You can find information about apprenticeship providers in your area on the Find apprenticeship training webpage.

Further Education



Level 3 Further Education Courses



- ▶ Level 3 Further Education (FE) qualifications are broadly comparable to AS and A-Levels and include a range of qualifications such as BTEC and OCR Nationals; VRQs and Access to Higher Education Diplomas. The Advanced Technical Award is a programme at development stage which is based on a Level 3 BTEC Extended Diploma with the addition of work experience and project-based learning and is available in a small range of subject areas.
- However, it is important if considering a Higher Education course at an FE college/university, that you research entry requirements on the relevant college/university websites/ UCAS before you start the course, as not all Level 3 qualifications meet application criteria for courses.

Level 3 Access Courses

- ▶ Level 3 Access courses are offered by FE colleges and are designed to provide a pathway to Higher Education study (such as HNCs, HNDs, Foundation degrees and degrees) for students who do not meet the traditional entry criteria. Check out Routes into Higher Education for more information.
- There are different Access courses available, depending on which Higher Education course you would like to take. You should check specific Higher Education course entry criteria, such as suitable Access courses, with the relevant course provider.

Please note that some of the Level 3 Access Diplomas offered across local FE colleges are validated by <u>Queen's University</u> <u>Belfast</u>, while others are validated by <u>Ulster University</u>. Please contact course providers directly for further information.

A Levels and AS levels



Advanced level qualifications (known as A levels) are **subject-based qualifications** that can lead to university, further study, training, or work. You can normally study three or more A levels over two years.

- ▶ A Levels are normally studied in school or at an FE college.
- ► They are also available to study part-time at FE colleges.
- ► A Levels are the full qualification and are made up of both AS (Advanced Subsidiary) and A2 Levels.
- ► The AS (Advanced Subsidiary) Level is usually studied in the first year and is a qualification in its own right.
- Students can progress to study the A2 level to complete an A Level qualification.
- ► Alternatively, you can take all the AS and A2 level units in one year to complete the full A level qualification.
- You usually need 5 GCSEs at grades A*-C in order to study AS and A Levels in a school.

Please note that every school sets its own admissions criteria and it's important that you research entry requirements.

Level 4 qualifications






- Higher National Certificates (HNCs) are vocational (work-related) higher education qualifications which are delivered in FE colleges. To study for an HNC, you will need some previous qualifications.
- HNCs focus on learning-by-doing and because they are designed to equip you with specific vocational skills for a particular field of work, can lead straight to a career. You can also use the qualifications to progress within your current career to gain professional status.
- ► HNCs take around **one year to complete on a full-time basis; two years part-time**. They can allow entry into the second year of a degree (you should check specific degree entry criteria with the relevant course provider).

Higher Level Apprenticeships

- If you have completed a Level 3 Apprenticeship programme, A-Levels, or equivalent Level 3 qualifications, you may wish to consider a <u>Higher Level Apprenticeship</u>, which combines quality training and a recognised qualification with paid employment.
- ► Higher Level Apprenticeships are currently offered at Level 4

 Level 7 (Master's degree level), with the majority of HLAs offered at Level 5 (Foundation degree level). HLAs at Levels 6 and 7 may also be referred to as Degree Apprenticeships. The length of a Higher Level Apprenticeship will vary depending on the programme you choose, but will be a minimum of two years.
- ► Benefits of a Higher Level Apprenticeship include the opportunity to achieve a higher level qualification, without having to pay higher education tuition fees.

Level 5 qualifications





- ► <u>Higher National Diplomas (HNDs)</u> are **vocational (work-related) higher education qualifications** which are delivered in FE colleges. To study for a HND, you will need some previous qualifications. Most HND courses require 1 A-Level or equivalent qualification (please check specific requirements with course provider).
- ▶ HNDs focus on **learning-by-doing** and because they are designed to equip you with specific vocational skills for a particular field of work, can lead straight to a career. You can also use the qualifications to progress within your current career to gain professional status.
- ► HNDs take around two years to complete on a full-time basis, and can also be taken part-time, which takes longer. HNDs can allow entry into the second, or third year of a degree if the course modules align with those of the second-year course (you should check specific degree entry criteria with the relevant course provider).

Foundation degrees



▶ Foundation degrees are higher education qualifications which blend academic with work-based learning, offering a clear route to university or into employment. They are mainly taught in FE colleges. If you have a Foundation degree, you may be able to top up to a degree at your place of study, or enter a degree course elsewhere at the start of the second, third or final year. Entry requirements for a Foundation degree will depend on the course and the college. They will normally be A-Levels or vocational equivalents such as BTEC National Diplomas.

Technical and Professional Qualifications

- ► FE colleges offer qualifications, at both Level 4 and 5, in a range of subjects aligned to technical or academic routes that provide pathways to an occupation or to further studies. They cover a **wide range of vocational areas**, including accounting, business, sport, hair and beauty, motor vehicle, construction and engineering.
- ▶ These qualifications are offered through a number of awarding organisations including Accounting Technicians Ireland, City & Guilds, Chartered Institute of Marketing, Chartered Institute of Personnel and Development, Oxford Cambridge and RSA, Open College Network Northern Ireland, Pearson, Northern Council for Further Education and Vocational Training Charitable Trust.

Higher Level Apprenticeships



- ► If you have completed a Level 3 Apprenticeship programme, A-Levels or equivalent Level 3 qualifications, you may wish to consider a <u>Higher Level Apprenticeship</u>, which combines quality training and a recognised higher level qualification with paid employment.
- ► Higher Level Apprenticeships are currently offered at Level 4 (equivalent to HND level), Level 5 (equivalent to HND/
 Foundation degree level), Level 6 (degree level) and Level 7 (Master's degree level), with the majority of HLAs offered at Level 5 (Foundation degree level).


Level 6 qualifications



Degrees 1

- ▶ <u>Degrees</u> are higher education qualifications that help you to develop a thorough understanding of a subject. To study for a <u>Bachelor's degree</u>, leading to a qualification such as Bachelor of Science (BSc), you will need to have the qualifications to meet the entry criteria for your chosen course. Bachelor's degrees can be offered on a **full-time and/or part-time basis**. Contact the relevant course provider to find out more about the entry requirements and whether it is offered on a full-time or part-time basis.
- ► The FE colleges also provide some degree level courses. More information can be found on the college websites.
- You can use your degree to progress into employment, and/or to get a place on a <u>postgraduate course</u>, such as a diploma or Master's degree.

- ► Higher Level Apprenticeships are currently offered at Level 4 Level 7 (Master's degree level).

Postgraduate 🕟

- If you want to continue your studies after a <u>Bachelor's degree</u>, or learn more about a particular subject, there are a range of **postgraduate qualifications** available.
- ► Some are linked to a **specific profession**, while others allow you to complete an **original piece of research**.
- ▶ There are four main types of postgraduate qualifications:
 - postgraduate certificates
 - postgraduate diplomas
 - master's degrees
 - doctorates
- ▶ Most types of postgraduate qualifications will include **taught and research elements**. Normally, to study for a postgraduate qualification, you will need to have a <u>Bachelor's degree</u> at 2:2 level or above. To find out the entrance requirements for a particular postgraduate course, visit the <u>UCAS</u> website.

Applying for a higher education course

<u>Higher education</u> qualifications include:

Undergraduate – Diplomas; Foundation degrees; Bachelor's degrees

Postgraduate – Master's degrees; PhDs or doctorates; Postgraduate diplomas; postgraduate certificates; postgraduate conversion courses

How to apply for a higher education course

- You can search and apply for most higher education courses online.
- You usually have to be 18 or older to take a higher education course. They're usually taught in universities, FE colleges, and specialist institutions, like art schools or agricultural colleges.
- How and when you apply for higher education depends on where you wish to study and what type of course you're applying for.

Whichever route you choose, it's worth starting your preparations early!

Timing of applications

- ▶ <u>UCAS</u> and <u>CAO</u> will each have set timeframes/deadlines for each part of the application process, and key dates will vary year to year.
- ► It is important that you familiarise yourself with the key stages and timings of the relevant applications process UCAS publishes a valuable toolkit for student applicants; CAO also publishes a very useful application guide/handbook.

Applying for a part-time undergraduate course at university

- ► To apply for a part-time undergraduate course, you must apply directly to the university or college.
- ➤ You can search <u>Discover Uni</u> for UK-based part-time undergraduate courses by course name, provider name or location.
- ► For Republic of Ireland based providers, you can search via Education in Ireland.



Applying for a postgraduate higher education course

- Each institution has its own application procedure, so you'll need to pay attention to deadlines, as they may be different for each course.
- You can search and apply for postgraduate courses online.
- Like undergraduate courses, most postgraduate courses can be taken on a full-time or a part-time basis.

Finding a postgraduate course

- University and college postgraduate prospectuses list research opportunities and taught courses.
- Online resources such as <u>Prospects</u> provide information on postgraduate courses and institutions in the UK. If you are interested in a research opportunity, you can sign up on the Prospects website to have research vacancies e-mailed to you.
- ► For postgraduate study in the Republic of Ireland, universities set their own criteria for admission and you apply directly to the institution. Please check the relevant institution website for further details on the application process.

Training, skills and employment support programmes

Helping you into work

There are a range of initiatives and programmes structured to assist those who may face additional challenges in regard to employment, such as those with disabilities/health conditions; carers; returners to the workplace; lone parents, etc.

Some of the support available includes:

► Step Up

The recently launched, individualised programme <u>Step Up</u> is available within local **Further and Higher Education establishments**. It provides opportunities for 16-24 year olds to **re-engage with skills and learning**, **and to provide access to employment**.

Disabilities/Health Conditions

NI Direct has information on <u>schemes available for those with</u> <u>disabilities or health conditions</u>.

▶ Unemployed

For those who are currently unemployed and looking for experience in the workplace, the <u>Work Experience Programme</u> can help develop **employability skills**.

The <u>Skills for Life and Work Programme</u> is aimed at young people who require experience of work and **Entry Level/Level 1 qualifications**.

► Midlife MOT – Your Work

Find out about **flexible working options** and **learn new skills** to suit your changing needs with <u>Midlife MOT – Your Work</u>.

Other training and skills programmes

DfE Assured Skills Academies

<u>DfE Assured Skills Academies</u> offer pre-employment training to equip individuals with the skills needed to compete for new employment opportunities.

- ▶ DfE works with **new and expanding companies** that have current job vacancies available, and offers pre- employment training to meet the skills needed for those jobs. Individuals that successfully complete an Assured Skills Academy training programme are guaranteed a **job interview** with the recruiting company.
- A weekly training allowance is paid to participants while on the programme, and weekly travel expenses are reimbursed. Participants may also be eligible for assistance with childcare costs. To find out more, please see <u>DfE Assured Skills</u> Academies.

SKILL UP - The flexible skills programme

If you're aged 18 and over and eligible to work in Northern Ireland, a range of free, accredited short courses are available to help you re-train and re-skill, through <u>SKILL UP - the flexible skills programme</u>. All courses are delivered by the local further and higher education providers.

- Opportunities are available from entry to postgraduate levels, focusing on skills identified by industry, linked to priority economic sectors. Fully funded places are available until the end of March 2027.
- Courses will be delivered online primarily, and will provide an opportunity to re-skill and upskill into areas identified as being economic growth sectors in Northern Ireland.
